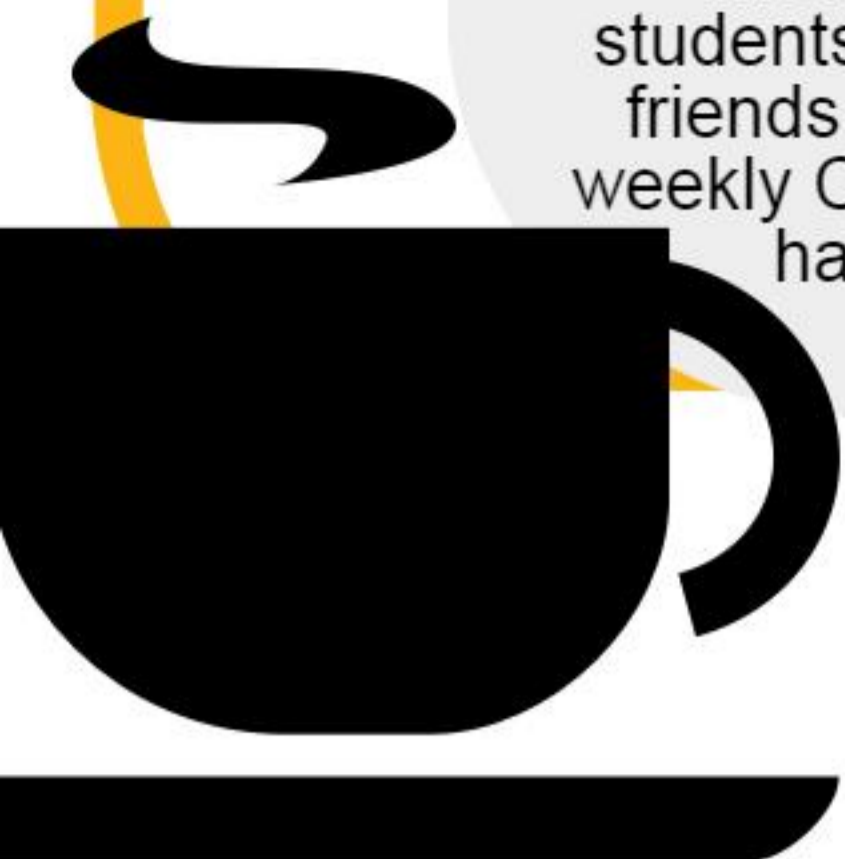

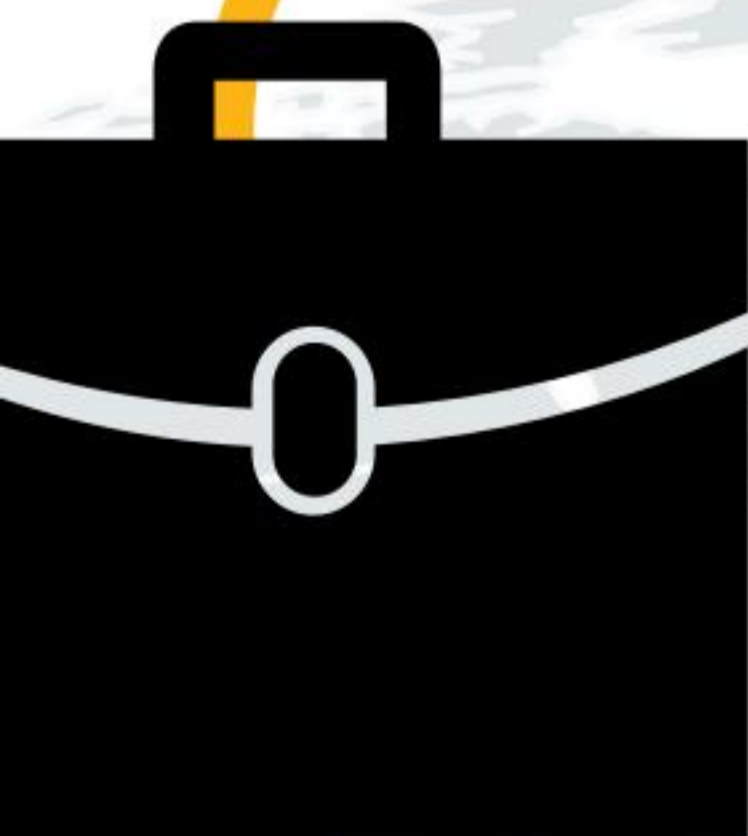

The Peer Mentorship Program assists incoming first year and transfer international students successfully transition to life at UC Berkeley. We match current students with incoming students to create small communities of support based on similar academic interests.

Each semester BIO recruits and trains Orientation Leaders who are in turn offered a great opportunity to explore leadership traits and develop intercultural communication skills while gaining transferable skills well suited for a resume.

Global Student Ambassadors assist BIO in meeting the needs of the varied and diverse UC Berkeley international student population. Participants set personal and professional goals with supervising Advisor; receive monthly training to explore and develop intercultural communication skills.
